It has been 70 years since world leaders explicitly spelled out the rights everyone on the planet could expect and demand simply because they are human beings. Born of a desire to prevent another Holocaust, the Universal Declaration of Human Rights demonstrates the power of ideas to change the world. The Universal Declaration of Human Rights (UDHR) was adopted on December 10, 1948. To mark the anniversary, **every day for the next 30 days the UN Human Rights Office is publishing fact sheets to put each of the Declaration's 30 Articles into perspective.** The series will attempt to show how far we have come, how far we have to go, and honour those who helped breathe life into stirring aspirations. 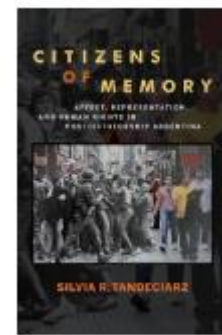
